## 4 Local education agency (LEA) or education service center

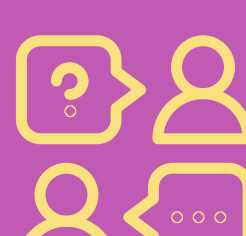
Talk to your LEA or education service center. They may be able to provide support or connect you to help.
